Sisters and brothers,

This Tuesday evening, 92 of our children will be Confirmed by Archbishop Coleridge. It is another step along the way to the completion of their Christian Initiation — a journey that began at the font as infants for most. Many of us have memories of being confirmed at the beginning of our teenage years; a moment that was often described as us making an adult decision in faith. It can seem strange to many that the order of the sacraments have changed. Perhaps the best description is not that the order has changed, but they have been restored to their most ancient order.

In the early Church, Christian initiation was celebrated in one event — Baptism, Confirmation and First Eucharist were part of one liturgy of initiation. Over time, Baptism began to be celebrated at infancy, with Confirmation and First Communion being celebrated with a bishop later in life. The question then became: What was the best age to celebrate Confirmation and First Communion. The age of reason became the standard answer.

But the problem was that the age of reason varied from culture to culture. For some, the age of reason was around 7 years old, for others around 12, and for others again, even older. The Anglo-Celtic culture settled for about twelve, and so, Confirmation and First Communion was celebrated at 12 years of age or so.

Pope Pius X didn't think that delaying First Communion was such a great idea. In 1910, he set the standard age of reason at about 7 years old. What happened for most of the 20th century, then, was that First Communion was celebrated at about age 7, while Confirmation tended to stay where it was — celebrated around 12 years of age. Because the link with Baptism had been lost, Confirmation needed to been given a meaning, so people began to speak of Confirmation as our adult decision for faith. After the Second Vatican Council in the 1960s, the Church rediscovered some of the ancient practices of our faith. With this in mind, the ancient order of Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist was restored. Not all dioceses around Australia or around the world follow the restored order, but this order has been the policy of the Archdiocese of Brisbane for at least 15 years. Last year, a new policy was introduced to separate Confirmation from First Communion by about a year. These children will celebrate First Communion next year, allowing them more time to prepare.

As these families celebrate one ancient practice this week, let us remember another ancient practice throughout this week — please pray for these children as they receive the fullness of God's Spirit and pray that these the gifts that will carry throughout their lives. Fr. Anthony

# Clayfield Conversations

A private member's bill to legalise abortion in Queensland has been introduced in State Parliament. The bill will go to a parliamentary committee for consideration before being presented to Parliament for debate. Last week, The Catholic Leader spoke to Archbishop Coleridge about a Catholic response to the proposed bill.

# A Q&A with Archbishop Coleridge

How should Catholics in Queensland respond (to the proposed private member's bill in State Parliament on abortion)? First of all understand the legislation and what it is saying. And that is important. Then understand the human reality of abortion. The situation in which a woman considers an abortion is an incredibly complex human situation. The point is often made that no woman runs gleefully to an abortion clinic. It is a very complex, anguishing decision for a woman and perhaps her spouse or partner, and for the whole of society. The abortion itself can seem a short-term solution, but ends up being no solution at all, creating a whole series of other problems. Often abortion is presented as an issue of a woman is right to choose but, in many ways, to have an abortion or pressure to have an abortion is a denial of the choices that should be put before a woman because abortion is not the only choice a woman faces in that very complex situation. So what claims to be pro-choice in many ways is in fact anti-choice. So it's a defeat for the woman. But it is also a defeat for her spouse or partner who can often be a forgotten figure in this whole scene. It is defeat for us all. Because abortion, the deliberate taking of a human life is about the woman, but it is also about what really matters to this society. And that is why I say abortion is a defeat for us all. I would like to think that for the Catholic Church as we engage in this debate we will do so in defence of the wellbeing of the child in the womb, the woman considering an abortion, her spouse or partner, but also as society as a whole. I would see this legislation as an attempt to address the great complexity of abortion, but doing so in a way that creates more problems than it resolves. What it enshrines in law is in some ways a double defeat of humanity in what it provides for abortion and what it denies for conscience.

### In practical terms, what could Catholics do?

Firstly, do your homework. Secondly, make your views known to your local politician. There really is no substitute for that. Write letters. Go and see them personally. They are human beings faced with a very difficult decision. You've got to understand it from their point of view. Any kind of respectful contact is recommended. No politician will respond to having their door kicked down, or people speaking disrespectfully or angrily. So take a respectful, clear-sighted and determined approach to the local member.

### Is there a passage in scripture to look to at this time and facing this issue?

The very first page of the Bible: God saw all that he had made and found it good. Life is not a curse. And yet abortion presumes that it is a curse or at least a burden. Life is a great gift and a great blessing. It comes to us on the first page of the scripture. To treat the child in the womb as some kind of tumour that has to be removed from the woman is fraught with not only difficulty but danger for the child and the woman and all of us. I've long thought that the kind of violence done to children in the womb does have its effects on the levels of violence in the whole society. Indeed it is not even unlinked to child abuse. You can use all the euphemisms you like but it's an appalling violence to the embryonic child and that must affect the way not only we view but also enact violence outside the womb. Instinctively that could well be true because the effects of abortion on the woman and her spouse or partner can be profound and life-long. And that it could become a form of domestic violence at some point wouldn't surprise me at all.

Following consultation with the parish community, an earlier Saturday evening will be trialled. From <u>Saturday</u>, <u>2nd July</u> the 6pm Saturday Mass will change to 5pm.
