Dear sisters and brothers,

This Sunday we find ourselves in Martha's house, overhearing a little domestic tiff with her sister, Mary, and which Martha asks Jesus to adjudicate. Jesus' response to Martha's grievance is to say that there is a time and place for everything, and Mary's zen-like repose is "the better part". Jesus offers no help to parents who attempt to negotiate a better performance from their children around the home – "but Jesus says that I can just sit here while everyone else does all the work!"

There is a time and place for pause and reflection. It is not only "the better part" but also "the necessary part". Something in our human nature seeks ways to discover "truth"; to take time to consider the universe and our place in it, and to respond to the yearning that draws us beyond ourselves and ponder things of "ultimate concern". We can pretend that these questions don't exist, and be busy about all sorts of things. No matter how busy we make ourselves, the questions don't go away.

So how do we choose "the better part" - to take time for reflection and spiritual development? There are many ways, but reading is a time-honoured source of enlightenment and renewal. Books on spirituality abound and remains a source of interest in our secular society. In our parish, we have an excellently maintain library. If you haven't visited the library for a while, choose "the better part" and come in and browse this weekend. The books are there to be borrowed, so please make use of this parish resource as a way of exploring the depths of the spirit.

The other side of the story is Martha. Jesus wasn't saying that service is unimportant. Jesus was emphasising that contemplation and service — prayer and action — go hand-in-hand. With that in mind, over the coming weeks we will be calling for nominations for our parish pastoral council. As has been mentioned previously, with the new installation of a council, we will also change the name to Community and Mission Council to give clearer focus and tighter agenda to our work. I ask you to consider either nominating yourself or others for service to our parish through becoming a member of the Community and Mission Council. We often take many things for granted or underestimate what we have to offer one another. I invite you to take some time to reflect on whether you or someone that you know might have something to bring to this table of parish service. Fr. Anthony

2016 - The Year of Mercy

A Word of Mercy....Someone recently said to me that in the world there are more enemies than friends, and I believe he is right. Instead, let us build bridges of reconciliation among us, beginning in the family. How many siblings have argued and become estranged...This shouldn't happen! This year is the year of reconciliation, with God and among us! (*Pope Francis*) **Clayfield Conversations**

This is the Extraordinary Jubilee Year of Mercy. Over these weeks, we will explore various aspects and dimensions of mercy.

What is the Extraordinary Jubilee Year of Mercy?

Pope Francis has declared this year to be an Extraordinary Jubilee Year of Mercy. It began on December 8th, last year and will conclude on the feast of Christ the King on November 20th, this year. Jubilee years are particular celebrations of the Church which proclaim and promote the "Lord's year of favour" upon us. The concept of a Jubilee year dates back to about the 14th century, and are pronounced every 25 to 50 years.

The concept is an ancient Jewish idea of jubilee is found in the book of Leviticus (25:8-55) in which the fiftieth year is declared to be a year of justice, renewal and restoration. It is time of blessing, re-establishing right relationships, forgoing debt, seeking forgiveness and experiencing healing – not only personally but also communally and socially. The dream of the jubilee year is a little like hitting "Alt-Ctrl-Delete" on our computer keyboard; it was a year of re-setting and re-starting. The spirit of the jubilee year is also described in the writings of the prophet Isaiah (61:1-2), and which Jesus proclaimed at the beginning of his ministry:

The spirit of the Lord GOD is upon me, because the LORD has anointed me; he has sent me to bring good news to the oppressed, to bind up the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and release to the prisoners; to proclaim the year of the LORD's favour.

The previous year of jubilee was in the year 2000, known as "the Great Jubilee" and the next is expected to be 2050. The special focus of this year is "mercy", inviting us to consider Jesus as "the living face of the mercy of the father". The Holy Doors at St. Peter's were opened on December 8th, with other "Holy Doors" opened around the world. In the archdiocese, there are eight "holy doors" – places of pilgrimage if you like – where people can experience the Father's mercy as an "open door of grace". These places are: The Cathedral, Red Hill, Clear Island Waters, Annerley, Ipswich, Nambour and Marian Valley in the Gold Coast Hinterland. The sacrament of reconciliation is offered regularly in each of those centres.

In announcing the Year of Mercy, Pope Francis emphasised that "No one can be excluded from the mercy of God," and again repeating, "No one can be excluded from the mercy of God!" Pope Francis continued, "The church is the house that welcomes all and refuses no one. Its doors remain wide open, so that those touched by grace can find the certainty of forgiveness." This is a great and complex challenge for the Church in today's world, but it is no greater challenge than living our calling of following in the way of Jesus day in and day out, year in and year out.

Special Tribute and Thank You to PETER RYAN 18 August 1924 - 9 June 2016

Many regular Sunday 9am Mass attendees will remember him as always wearing a suit to church, even in 40 degree summer heat. Others may recall him for his wonderfully strong and vociferous style as a liturgy reader. And some will just think of him as one of the nice guys of St Agatha's. One thing for certain is that with the recent death of Peter Ryan we have lost one of our most well known and long-serving parishioners.

Peter was an active member of the St Agatha's community as a Eucharistic minister and reader along with being a grandparent to a couple of St Agatha's students. Since moving into the area in the mid-1990's, he has been a major contributor to parish life and a proud Catholic. He loved his faith and it provided a guiding force throughout his 91 years.



Outside of the parish he was an obsessive golfer and his work in dentistry led to him being awarded an Order of Australia Medal for his efforts in successfully having Queensland's water supplies fluoridated. His family was the centre of his life, and many of them will continue to share his legacy as parishioners of St Agatha's.
