Parishes are reliant on the faith, energies and commitment of parishioners. There are many avenues for involvement in parish life, not least of which is by simply turning-up each week and being part of the community. However, at the moment, we are seeking nominations for membership of our Pastoral Council. A parish pastoral council plays an important role in enhancing the life of a community through sharing their gifts of leadership and encouraging the gifts of others. Parish pastoral councils are an important facet of enriching a community's life with the baptismal vocation of all parishioners. With this in mind, we have decided to extend the time for nominations until Monday 15 August. There are no particular attributes needed; just some availability, wisdom, energy and interest in the wider church and dedication to the parish community. So please give some thought to either self-nomination or nominating a fellow parishioner.

With the change-over of membership, we will also change the name to Community and Mission Council. The term "pastoral council" has been used since about the time of the Second Vatican Council to describe a group of parishioners who meet with the parish priest to shape the life and vision of the parish life. However, the term "pastoral" has become a little diluted and, as a result, parish pastoral councils can lose their focus. The aim of changing the name to "Community and Mission Council" is to sharpen the "pastoral" dimension of the council.

The community dimension will focus on these areas:

- Developing greater connections with our school community;
- Faith and ministry formation;
- Supporting family and youth ministry;
- Hospitality and social events.

The missionary dimension will focus on these areas:

- Engagement with the broader community
- Social justice and outreach;
- Ecumenical connections:
- Developing an understanding of evangelisation in the contemporary world.

In a particular way, the incoming Community and Mission Council will be tasked with overseeing our preparations for the celebration of our parish and school centenary celebrations in 2018. For this project, we will need to draw together all the skills, talents, generosity and imagination of the whole parish community. Please consider how you might be able to contribute to this larger project. You might even decide that you have something to offer our Community and Mission Council.

### Clayfield Conversations

This is the Extraordinary Jubilee Year of Mercy. Over these weeks, we will explore various aspects and dimensions of mercy.

#### **Mercy and Sin**

One of the great fallacies of promoting a more merciful approach is that it becomes a licence to sin. Mercy is not laxness or permissiveness. Mercy, rightly understood, makes us more alert to sin and the damage that it causes in its manifold forms. A merciful heart is one that is more conscious of the wounds of this world, their causes and the need for reconciliation. Pope Francis challenged us to re-imagine God's mercy when he opened the Holy Doors for the Jubilee Year of Mercy. He said, "How much wrong we do to God and his grace when we speak of sins being punished by his judgment before we speak of their being forgiven by his mercy. We have to put mercy before judgment, and in any event God's judgement will always be in the light of his mercy." God's judgement is real, but it is a judgement which shines "the light of mercy" into every darkness. It is a judgement which heals and mends the damage that we do to ourselves and one another.

Firstly, we need to acknowledge that sin causes real and deep pain in the world – pain to ourselves, to another, and to creation itself. This is not God's dream for the human person or the created universe. Nevertheless, we can get fixated on little things and call them sin: our bad thoughts, our bad words and our bad actions. Mercy asks us to look deeper. We are members of the human race that seems hell bent on destruction and rivalry in one way or another. As members of the human family, we share a common human shame in this regard. We sense, even if we can't quite name it, a woundedness in us, a feeling that we are not quite as we should be, and we find ourselves saying with St. Paul:

I do not understand my own actions. For I do not do what I want, but I do the very thing I hate...But in fact it is no longer I that do it, but sin that dwells within me...I can will what is right, but I cannot do it. For I do not do the good I want, but the evil I do not want is what I do. Now if I do what I do not want, it is no longer I that do it, but sin that dwells within me. (Romans 7:15-20)

There is an estrangement somewhere in our depths; the tension that with comes with being people who are made to live forever, but living out our lives haunted, consciously or otherwise, with the finality of death. The niggling voice eats away at us and says, "Is this all there is?" And if this might be all there is, we take what we can get, seeking our own advantage, our own self-interests, taking risks to find fulfilment here and now, over and about the needs of others. Sin is a consequence of our blindness and reluctance to see the larger horizons to which God calls us because we suffer from tunnel vision. Tunnel vision narrows our view, and we fail to see that our hearts are small, that our neighbour is suffering and we are wandering along a rather insular and rugged pathway.

The very first words that God spoke into creation was, "Let there be light!" This is actually a word of mercy. This is God's Word of new creation which is spoken in mercy to each one of us as we contemplate our darkness and blindness. As a punishment, God does not say, "Heal yourselves of your blindness"; God says in creative love and mercy, "Let there be light!"
