The angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream, and said "Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife."

Dear friends,

This week we hear Matthew's story of Joseph and Mary – a young couple who find themselves in an impossible situation. "Before they came to live together, Mary was found to be with child". Not so much an unusual event these days, but in the days of Mary and Joseph, this was a great family and religious crisis. It is also where we catch a glimpse of the greatness of Joseph and how his character became an obvious influence on Jesus.

When Mary was found to be pregnant before she lived with Joseph, this is what was meant to happen according to Jewish law: Joseph was supposed to take Mary to the door of her father's house, and once there, her fellow citizens were to stone her to death. Imagine if Joseph was a man of the law, and did what he was supposed to do. What would you and I be doing tonight/today? There would be no Christmas story to tell, certainly not one as we know it. Instead, even before he has a dream of the angel, Joseph is loving and protective towards Mary, even at the expense of his own personal reputation. But then Joseph listens to a dream and he takes Mary into his home. Interestingly, in Luke's gospel Mary receives the news from an angel; in Matthew's gospel it is Joseph who receives the news of Jesus' birth. Even before Jesus was born, Joseph had given him an example of the power of love over the obligations of the law and the power of dreams over the limits of reality.

We don't know much about Joseph, but when we look at Jesus, and how he lived his life, we can see traces of Joseph's character. Joseph ignored the dictates of the Law in order to protect Mary. Time and again, Jesus ignores the details of the Law in order to reach out in love to others. He first learnt this from Joseph. Jesus knew that if Joseph had followed the Law, he would not have been born. He knew too that Joseph learnt to listen to and interpret his dreams – they were a guide for Joseph's life and his decisions. Joseph learnt to trust these dreams. Jesus learnt to trust his dreams too – the dream of the good news, the dream of the Beatitudes, the dream of the Kingdom, even the impossible dream of the resurrection. Joseph's common sense, his compassion and his faith allowed Emmanuel – God-with-us – to be born in our very midst. May this Joseph be a father for us as well, and like Jesus, may we inherit his goodness.

A month ago, I was talking with a country farmer. He told me how he pruned his olive trees. An ordinary farmer with olive trees, but when he talked about how he pruned them, it was clearly with great love; he had that relationship with nature. He pruned those trees as if he was their father, with love. May we never lose this relationship with nature, with creation. It assures dignity to us all.

Clayfield Conversations

Today's Gospel announces that 'God is with us'. In this final week of Advent the following story reminds us that God comes to us in unpredictable ways often with a presence that challenges and changes our perspective.

The Dolly and a White Rose by V. A. Bailey

I hurried into the shop to grab some last minute Christmas gifts. I looked at all the people and grumbled to myself. I would be in here forever. I hurried to the toy department and wondered if the grandkids would even play with my gifts.

My eye caught a little boy holding a doll. He kept touching her hair and he held her so gently. I watched him turn and ask, "Aunty Jane, are you sure I don't have enough money?" Gently, the woman replied, "Emily doesn't need a doll David." The woman went to another aisle. The boy continued to hold the doll. David looked so sad that I couldn't resist asking who the doll was for. "My sister wanted it so badly for Christmas." I told him that maybe Santa was going to bring it. He said "No, Santa can't go where my sister is...I have to give the doll to Mummy to take to her." I asked him where his sister was. He looked at me with the tear-filled eyes, "She has gone to be with Jesus. Daddy says that Mummy is going to have to go to be with both of them soon too." My heart nearly stopped beating. David went on, "I told Daddy to make sure Mummy goes nowhere until I got back from the store. I want Mum to take this doll to Emily."

While he wasn't looking I reached into my purse and pulled out some cash. "David how about we count that money again?" He grew excited, "I asked Jesus to give me enough money. I just know I have enough." I slipped my money in with his and we began to count it. He looked up from the count and exclaimed, "Jesus has given me enough money for Emily's doll."

In a few minutes his aunty came back and I wheeled my cart away. I could not keep from thinking about the little boy as I finished my shopping in a totally different spirit than when I had started.

On the way home I remembered a story in the newspaper several days earlier about a drunk driver hitting a car and killing a little girl and that the mother was left on life support. Two days before Christmas I read in the paper where the family had turned the machine off. The day before Christmas there was a funeral notice saying that a Requiem Mass would be celebrated on St Stephen's Day for Julia Norris and her daughter Emily. Michael was their husband and father, and their son and brother was David.

As I gathered with my family in front of an overblown meal which none of us could finish, holding expensive gifts we didn't need and drinking more alcohol than was necessary, I thought "we've lost the plot with Christmas". God-with-us arrives as a simple child in need of love; and in the honour of that day we spend money, eat too much and get drunk.

I left the table went to my desk and wrote a card for each member of my family. I told them what I'd never been able to say: "I want you to know I love you."

When they read those cards, my family thought I was losing it, but through David and that doll, God visited me in the last week of Advent and Christmas will never be the same again.




GIVE THE GIFT OF FAITH
