

Dear friends,

After the untarnished delivery of the statistics of child abuse within the Catholic Church at the Royal Commission this past week, it is difficult to know what to say. Perhaps an sombre unnerved disquiet is the most appropriate response. The statistics covered the period between 1950 and 2010. There has been sufficient coverage of the raw data without needing to go over it again; it is important to remember that every statistic represents a human life irrevocably changed. In response to the data, Francis Sullivan, CEO of the Truth, Justice and Healing Commission which liaises between the Catholic Church and the Royal Commission, addressed the Hearing:

It is a history that must be told and reckoned with. These numbers are shocking, they are tragic and they are indefensible. And each entry in this data, for the most part represents a child who suffered at the hands of someone who should have cared for and protected them. And let's not forget the ripples of the abuse also felt by their family, friends and carers. These secondary victims need not only to be acknowledged but to be tangibly supported and compensated for the impact on their lives.

Notwithstanding the fact that the average period of time to report abuse is more than thirty years, the figures do show a substantial drop off of reported cases in recent decades. Being involved in Catholic Education, I absolutely believe that our schools are as safe as any educational environment. Being involved in seminary formation, I know that substantive efforts have been made to improve the quality and depth of human development in our future priests. Being involved in parish communities, I know that a number of protocols and processes have been established which serve to raise our awareness of our common responsibilities in regard to child protection. This searing experience of the Royal Commission is important because facing our difficult and troubling history is the first step in walking towards a safer and more faithful future.

## The Wisdom of Pope Francis

We must ask the Lord for two graces. The first: to know what is in our own heart, not to deceive ourselves, not to live in deceit. The second grace: to do what is good in our hearts and not to do the evil that is in our hearts. Why is speaking ill of another a sin? Because there is hatred in my heart, not love. We must always ask for this grace: to know what is happening in our heart, to constantly make the right choice, the choice for good.

**Clayfield** Conversations

In these days of the final examination of the Royal Commission into the Catholic Church, this reflection by Fr. David Ranson, Vicar General of the diocese of Broken Bay, and one of the experts appearing at the Commission sessions, offers us some hope for a way forward. It comes from his book, *The Paschal Paradox*.

#### The Quality of Grief

This story is one about a Zen monk in Japan: The emperor had an absolutely magnificent vase that was ancient and intricately beautiful One day someone let the vase fall and it split into millions of fragments. The fragments were gathered up and the best potter in the land was called to reassemble the vase. He came but failed. He paid for his failure by losing his head. The emperor called the next best potter and he also failed. This continued for weeks until, finally, all the best artists in the land had died, having failed to reassemble the broken, beautiful vase. There was only one artist left, an old Zen monk who lived in a cave in the mountains. He had a young apprentice. He came and collected all the fragments himself and brought them back to his workshed. For weeks and weeks he worked until, finally, the vase was there again. The apprentice looked at it and thought how beautiful it was. The two of them made the journey to the city and brought the vase into the palace. The emperor and all his courtesans beamed in admiration at the beauty of the reassembled vase. The old Zen monk was graciously rewarded. He and his young apprentice went back to their cave in the mountains. Then, one day, the young apprentice was looking for something and unexpectedly came upon the fragments of the vase. He ran into his master: "Look at all the fragments of the vase. You never assembled them at all. How did you make a vase as beautiful as the ancient one that was broken?" The old master said, "if you do the work that you do from a loving heart, then you will always be able to make something beautiful."

Spiritual leadership begins in a climate of grief: grief for what has been lost, grief for what could be but which negative forces obstruct. The Lutheran scripture scholar, Walter Brueggemann, in his landmark work, The Prophetic Imagination, describes the prophet as the one in society who articulates the grief of the people. People are wounded, people are hurting, people experience a profound hunger. But this wound, or hunger or grief is lulled, and, at worst, denied by an ethos that can promise the situation is otherwise if one only subscribes to its logic - the logic of consumerism, of individualism, of success, of youth and glamour, for example - or even of military and economic imperialism. The genuinely spiritual voice is the one that has resisted the seduction and seen it for what it is: an empty promise, an illusion peddled out of self-interest and greed. The spiritual voice is the one, awake and alive, that gives back to people their hunger, their wound, their grief. It is the voice that has listened ever so deeply, reverently and attentively to the true situation of people and spoken out a word in which people can recognise their truth. The spiritual voice speaks out a word which, because it captures the truth of people, seizes their imagination and invites them into a new way of living, and onto a pathway which will not rob them of their humanity but which offers them fresh and constructive means of living out their humanity with one another. The truly spiritual voice does not condemn. Rather, it invites, it opens up new vistas, new horizons for the imagination. It does not tell people what they should be doing. It invites them to wonder how they could be. The spiritual leader thus acts like the creator of the new vase in the Zen story. In love, it gathers the fragments and generates something new and altogether beautiful.


## LENTEN REFLECTION GROUPS (1 March - 12 April)

## CHERISH LIFE

Last year, MP Mr Rob Pyne succeeded in passing a motion to have two abortion bills debated together on the first Wednesday evening sitting of 2017. The debate on the two bills could begin as soon as February 15. One of the bills allows abortion till 24 weeks for any reason, but after this gestational date a second doctor's opinion is called for. This is simply a ruse as there are no penalties in place should a second doctor's opinion not be sought. A law with no penalty is no law at all. Cherish Life Queensland and other pro-life organisations encourage you to take on any and/or all of the following action points:

- \* make an appointment to see your state MP and explain your opposition to more permissive abortion laws.
- \* if you cannot see your MP, write him/her a handwritten letter.
- \* write to Premier Anastasia Palaszczuk and LNP Leader Tim Nicholls.
