Jesus spat on the ground, made a paste with the spittle, put this over the eyes of the blind man and said to him, "Go and wash in the Pool of Siloam" (a name that means 'sent').

Dear friends,

This week's gospel is a tale of two journeys: one a gradual movement towards the light, and the other a spiral into increasing darkness. The rhythm of the storytelling is masterful. The ebb and flow of the drama serves to establish the direction

of the major players, either towards or away from Jesus. The scene is set two chapters earlier, when Jesus describes himself as "the water of life" and "the light of the world". By the end of this story, those with eyes to see will acknowledge the truth of both claims.

This event begins with a theological question. In first century Judaism, disability and disease were regarded as signs of the terrible judgement of God. In the disciples' thinking, someone's sin is to blame for this man's blindness. They are more interested in the technicalities of this proposition than the state of the man's health or his future prospects. Moving quickly beyond their short-sightedness, Jesus simply replies that this situation is no one's "fault". Rather this man, understood as "cursed", is to become a sign of God's goodness.

Jesus makes a mud paste, a traditional practice for treating eye diseases, and tells the man to go and wash in the Pool of Siloam. The author's note on the meaning of the name of the reservoir provides a double meaning. Not only has the blind man been sent by Jesus to wash, but also Jesus has been sent into the world to be "living" water". The man responds without hesitation to Jesus' word; he goes, he washes and he comes back healed. Unconditional response to the Word has previously led to other miracles in John's gospel, highlighting both the expectations and possibilities for those who choose to follow Jesus. The Pharisees, on the other hand, descend into blindness. Whenever the scriptures speak of "seeing", what is at stake is not "eyesight" but "insight". Lent is our annual eye test when we are invited to notice, through the eyes of faith, the invisible at the heart of the visible. Fr. Anthony

The Wisdom of Pope Francis

Lent is the time for saying no. No to the spiritual asphyxia born of the pollution caused by indifference, by thinking that other people's lives are not my concern, and by every attempt to trivialize life, especially the lives of those whose flesh is burdened by so much superficiality. Lent means saying no to the toxic pollution of empty and meaningless words, of harsh and hasty criticism, of simplistic analyses that fail to grasp the complexity of problems, especially the problems of those who suffer the most.

A CARING COMMUNITY



Nguyet spent 14 years of her life in silence and isolation. Her severe disability restricted her movements, her access to her neighbourhood, and her chance of an education. Nguyet's life changed when her neighbour introduced her to the Caritas-Australia sponsored program Capacity Building for Parent Associations Supporting Children with Disabilities (CBPA). Now a new world has opened for her. She is discovering her creativity, and reimagining her future. As a young neighbour looks on admiringly, a Vietnamese teenager transforms a pile of coloured paper into vivid flowers. When the little girl leaves, 15-year old Nguyet turns to the books brought by her in-home teacher, to practise her maths. Later she prepares a simple meal for her parents to eat when they return from work.

For her first 14 years, Nguyet was confined to living behind closed doors, with her parents close by to take care of her many health needs. Then a neighbour's kindness brought the outside world to Nguyet, and her life and the lives of her parents were changed forever. Thi Nhat Quynh is a teacher. "I'm Nguyet's neighbour, so I knew her when she was a little girl. I felt compassion for her." Through Quynh's introduction, Nguyet's mother, Nguyen Thi Tim, became linked with a Parents' Association. The Association is run through a program called Capacity Building for Parent Associations Supporting Children with Disabilities (CBPA) and has been supported by Caritas Australia since 2010. The program is managed by Catholic Relief Services, a local partner of Caritas Australia in Vietnam. Nguyen Thi Thuy Duong, Nguyet's case manager, explains: "The CBPA project aims to help parents by providing training so that they can support children with disabilities to integrate into the community, and be more confident in community integration." Through CBPA, students with disabilities attend neighbourhood schools alongside their peers whenever possible, and in-home education is offered for children like Nguyet who are confined by their disabilities. This made it possible for Quynh to lend a hand. "The school doesn't have enough facilities for children like her. I volunteered to come and teach her at her house," Quynh says. The program supports Quynh with resources so she is able to offer Nguyet lessons at home, teaching her maths, reading, writing and crafts. Parents' Associations in Vietnam have contributed considerably to communities, raising the awareness of parents of children with disabilities. Before, parents of children with disabilities were very reluctant to bring their children to join in public events. But they are now more confident, and can actively provide better care and education for their children. "Parents' Associations have proved their ability to the local government in helping disabled children. They also show that, whenever they are supported and cared for properly, children with disabilities can [achieve] change," says Duong.

Learning to express herself creatively has opened a new world to Nguyet. She designs and sews clothes for her dolls, and makes delicate paper flowers. Nguyet dreams of selling her flowers. Her quickness at maths has enabled her to help her parents with shopping, and introduced her to the world of business. The whole family has benefited. Her parents can go out to work knowing she will manage on her own. "We are very happy for her," her mother Tim says. Now, at last, she nurtures the hope that her child "can be independent, and build the future she wants."
