From the sixth hour there was darkness over all the land until the ninth hour. And about the ninth hour, Jesus cried out in a loud voice: "My God, my God, why have you deserted me?" Jesus, again crying out in a loud voice, yielded up his spirit.

Dear friends,

Today we celebrate Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord which means that Easter is at our door-step. If you are going away for the Easter break, we wish you a safe trip, and holy, festive celebrations. If you are staying at home, please join us for the three celebrations of the Sacred Triduum. The word "triduum" means "three days" and refers to the three days of Holy Thursday, Good Friday and the Easter Vigil. These three celebrations which continue over three days are in reality one liturgy. It all unfolds like this: At the conclusion of the Holy Thursday liturgy, there is a procession of the Blessed Sacrament to the altar of reservation and, after a period of prayer, people depart in silence with no dismissal. The Good Friday liturgy begins where things left off — with a procession, a period of silent prayer, and then, the opening prayer. Good Friday also finishes in silence. One liturgy flows into the other.

At the Easter Vigil we gather around a fire outside the church for the blessing of the fire and the lighting of the paschal candle. This three-day liturgy, which began with the entrance and greeting on Holy Thursday evening, has moved us from suffering through death to resurrection. The fullness of the Easter mystery is celebrated from a different perspective on each of the three days. The Triduum is not a re-enactment of past events separated into neat historical or liturgical compartments. The death and resurrection which we celebrate is our dying and rising with Christ today. So I invite you to join us for the full rhythm of the Easter Triduum and experience the powerful unfolding story of Jesus' life, death and resurrection. Please remember that there is no Sunday evening Mass next Sunday evening. I wish you all a happy and holy Easter and may the joy of the Risen Christ fill our hearts and minds with hope and love. *Fr. Anthony*

Each week during Lent, *Project Compassion* shares a story from various parts of the world. This week's story is from the Philippines.

Our Common Home: Our Future



In the coastal areas of the Philippines, extreme weather has caused extraordinary levels of devastation. Communities have been torn apart, lives lost and futures thrown into ruin. However, in the wake of Typhoon Santi, Aloma and her small children have moved from tragedy to triumph. In times of great need, our human instinct to help each other, to "love our neighbour", comes to the fore. Through Aloma's work with the Integrated Community Development Program, supported by Caritas

Australia, she has become a community leader, helping develop sustainable farming practices, business knowledge, and resilience to disasters. A few years ago, Aloma's village in the Philippines was a scene of devastation - high winds and high seas battered a barren stretch of sand. Extreme weather is a common enough occurrence in this vulnerable area, threatening the safety and food security of families struggling to survive. In 2009, when Typhoon Santi raged, Aloma and her small children cowered while their home fell to shreds around them. Hope first took root for the family in 2011, when Aloma became a participant in the Integrated Community Development Program (ICDP) run by the Socio Pastoral Action Center Foundation Inc. (SPACFI). "I was so happy ... I understood that the program would help the poor people in the village." Caritas Australia is a partner of SPACFI, and supports the ICDP. Aloma gained a range of skills through the program, including bookkeeping, managing logistics, and understanding ecology and environmental conservation. The program's training on the 'Cornerstone' principle guided her in developing a sense of accountability, and concern for others and for the environment. "All the skills that I learned, I pass on to friends and neighbours," she says. Along with others in the community, Aloma also undertook training in disaster risk reduction. She learnt how to manage the logistics of disaster response, and her husband had first-aid training. With Aloma's training, her confidence grew, and so did her awareness of the role she could play in caring for the land. "The greatest change in my life was to realise that the environment is very important. We grew up cutting down all the trees around us, including the mangroves ... and using [them] for firewood. Now, instead, we are planting the mangroves for our own protection. It is important to protect the environment. We are in a coastal area, and mangroves will protect us from a tsunami or flooding." Aloma has always been a community leader. She was chair of the Council for Youth in her area, and is now a board member of the Small Farmers and Fisherfolk Association, and treasurer of her local area. She is also on the Disaster Risk Reduction Council. Inspired by Aloma's leadership, the whole community now comes together – children and adults – to work in the mangrove nursery. Aloma says, "The community finds it enjoyable. It's just like community bonding for them, going in this area, planting the mangroves. Now it's become their lifestyle, to protect the coastal area [using] mangroves." Community-wide training in coastal management has enabled everyone to see the value of working together. Now the villagers are preparing a plan that will help them mitigate the impact of disasters in their area. Gazing out through the rows of mangroves, Aloma shares her dream for her family, for her community, and for their common home. "I have a simple dream for my family: that my children will be able to finish their schooling, unlike us, and eventually they will

have a better future. "My dream for my community is to continue what we are doing right now, so that the next

generation will benefit from what we have started."

The annual collection for the support of the church in the Holy Land takes place on Good Friday. This collection promotes the missionary work of the Church in the Holy Land by providing welfare assistance to local Christians in areas such as health, education, employment and housing. Parishes, schools, orphanages and medical centres throughout the Holy Land also rely on assistance from the Good Friday collection. The collection is also used to maintain 74 churches and shrines associated with the life of Jesus. Last year, Australian Catholics donated \$1.4 million to this cause, despite tough economic times, rural droughts and increasing cost of living which put a strain on

family budgets and financial resources. Your generosity is greatly appreciated. Please remember the Christians of the Holy Land again on this Good Friday. Please also pray that peace and harmony will become a reality in the birthplace of Jesus, the 'Prince of Peace'.
