year. Like watching the horses run down the Flemington straight, the remainder of the year always seems to go by in a flash. As if to acknowledge that, the Liturgy of the Word over the coming weeks begins to take a turn towards "the end times". This weekend, Jesus tells a story of a wedding. Usually, it's the bride who is late, but this time it is the bridegroom. The bridegroom turns up in the middle of the night (makes you wonder what he was up to), only to find that some the bridal party weren't prepared for the midnight arrival. The foolish bridesmaids have no extra oil for their lamps, so the bridal procession is only half as luminous as it might have been. To make matters worse, by the time they find oil for their lamps, they find themselves locked out of the wedding celebrations. Maybe the bridegroom didn't want such a large bridal party in the first place.

"So stay awake or you will miss out on the party!" is Jesus' final exhortation at the end of the parable. This time of the year is full of parties — we have one this Sunday to thank our children and families who have supported our P26 Masses throughout the year. Next Friday night, we have our end of year social to thank all those who have supported the parish community through their generous service throughout the year. But the Liturgy of the Word of the coming weeks serves as a warning about getting too distracted by the haste of the end of the year and its various festive celebrations. It is good to celebrate, to acknowledge and give thanks for one another and to build the bonds of community. But it is also true that we can let our lamps go out — we can become wearied by all the frantic activity, and our various celebrations can become one chore after another. Jesus' challenges us to save enough oil to keep the light of faith burning. Perhaps one way we can do that is to take a little time to name and be thankful for the blessings that God has bestowed on us this year. Thankfulness keeps the heart alive — and our lamps alight.

# The Bridegroom Is Coming!

As the end of the liturgical year draws to a close the Gospel message becomes one of urgency. Time is running out. Be alert. Stay awake. Are *you* ready for the arrival of God's reign?

The parable draws on two familiar images for a first century audience. In the Old Testament, the reign of God is frequently likened to a wedding banquet with God as the bridegroom reaching out in love to Israel the bride.

On the day of the wedding, all those invited would gather and then the bride would process from her father's house to the house of her fiancé. This would be an opportunity to display her beauty and the wealth of her dowry to the entire village. She would enter the house with her companions to await the arrival of the bridegroom after the festivities. The bridegroom would also arrive in a procession and then the wedding festivities began, this was usually late afternoon. The companion of the bride and groom would escort the groom into the bridal chamber. A last minute delay could occur if there was some disagreement over the marriage contract and bridal gifts. In the parable some of the bridesmaids have come prepared for a long wait, while others were not ready.

After the Resurrection, there was at first an enthusiastic expectation that God's final reign was about to dawn. Some members of that first community no doubt expected to be alive for Jesus' final coming in glory. By the time of Matthew's Gospel fifty years have passed and still people are waiting this final coming. Some are prepared for this and they have made an effort to have the necessary resources, while others find the waiting too long and their resources dry up. The Gospel asks me to consider my own resources and what I am doing to ensure that these do not run out, as some of the companions ran out of oil. What resources my faith? Daily personal quiet time with God, joining with others for reflective reading and prayer, being part of a local worshipping community, reading spiritual books, taking time for a retreat day occasionally and setting aside days each year for a retreat, checking out what is being offered at the local Spirituality Centre or taking a short course on some aspect of faith, and most of all, having a close friend I can talk with, about where God is in my life. These are the ways I find that nourish my faith, that provide the 'oil for my lamp'. And yes, this takes some effort – the daily discipline of making time, the yearly determination to set aside some days, keeping an eye out for good reading or good seminars being offered. But without these resources, I suspect like some of the bride's companions I could soon lose sight of my purpose.

The community in Thessalonica was one of the first Christian groups in Europe to be evangelised by Paul. This is an enthusiastic community who have received the Gospel with joy and anticipate that Jesus will be returning to them any day soon. But, as time passes some of the community die and this raises many questions for them. Will those who have died miss out on the joyous grace of Jesus' return? Are they dead forever, and now cut off from Christ? This seems to have been the idea in Matthew's community – Paul's response is to assure the Thessalonians that those who have died will not be disadvantaged. In Paul's thinking, when Jesus returns the dead will rise first. And then those left alive, and Paul includes himself in this group, will somehow join with the risen ones to meet Christ. Both readings give us a sense of the strong expectation felt by these two early communities, twenty and fifty years after the Easter event. The challenge for us is that the delay of Jesus' return is now two millennia. We have lost that sense of urgency, longing, hope, and joyful preparation.


