Making a whip of cords, he drove all of them out of the temple, both the sheep and the cattle. He also poured out the coins of the money changers and overturned their tables. He told those who were selling the doves, "Take these things out of here! Stop making my Father's house a marketplace!"

Dear Friends,

To understand the scandal and nervousness that unrest around the Temple caused, it is essential to understand the importance of the Temple to the economic life of Jerusalem. The Temple provided the two major sources of income for the citizens of Jerusalem and both are alluded to in this gospel reading. King Herod began a project to re-build the Temple in 19 BC and this undertaking lasted for eighty years. It is estimated to have employed almost 20 000 workers. Disturbances in the Temple area had the potential to raise the suspicions of the Romans and delay the work of re-construction, if not halt it permanently. Jewish leaders and construction workers, therefore, did not appreciate protestors in the Temple.

The city of Jerusalem was, and still is, the home of Jewish pilgrimage and this was the other major source of income. The role of the money-changers was to exchange Roman coinage for currency that was acceptable to the Jewish authorities. Roman coins were minted with images of Caesar, whom the Romans considered a deity, and were inscribed with reminders of imperial domination. To the Jews this was offensive and they insisted on the usage of other coins bearing acceptable inscriptions, usually shekels minted in the city of Tyre. The pilgrims would exchange their currency in order to pay Temple taxes or purchase animals to be sacrificed. Worshippers preferred to select animals at the Temple courts because this was a guarantee of a near-perfect sacrificial specimen; certainly one that would not be damaged by travelling any great distance. Set against the backdrop of the greatest and most scared of Jewish feasts, the Passover, Jesus could not have chosen a more public or dramatic moment to make his stand against the Temple system.

Only in John's gospel does Jesus make a whip from cords. It is worth remembering that Jesus only used this to drive out the animals. He overturned the tables of the money-changers and demanded the removal of the dove-sellers. This stunning demonstration was more than an attempt to stop profane activities in a scared place. It was a judgement against a whole religious structure that had commercialised and marketed access to God.

In the Temple system, the only way to cross the threshold to mercy and forgiveness was to pay for it. Jesus' statement declared that this whole religious system's days were numbered. He was the new Temple; the freely available and accessible doorway to the compassion of God. Jesus' action was not only a judgement upon the Temple economy, but also, it was a telling and confronting judgement upon any religious system which profits from its people and oppresses those most in need.

PROJECT COMPASSION



Project Compassion enables us to contribute to creating a better world for others through our weekly giving. Each week during Lent, we will share a story from different parts of the world. This week we meet Bayan from Jordan.

Bayan from Jordan

We all cherish our freedom. In the shared religious history of both Jews and Christians, the story of the exodus is one of God's liberating presence, drawing the people of Israel out of slavery to freedom.

It is in the middle of this desert journey that the story of the Ten Commandments is found. God speaks face to face with Moses. The Ten Commandments are as valid today as when they were first given on Mt Sinai. The Commandments continue to guide people of all the ages to live in right relationship with God and one another, to work for justice and peace. In the second reading we get a

glimpse of the community of the early church which is struggling to live in right relationships because they still carry the baggage of their former lives. In the Gospel reading Jesus recognised that the commercial practices of buying and selling in the precinct of the holy place were a barrier to people living in right relationship with God and others. He passionately intervenes to stop what appears to have become common practice in the temple precinct and 'calls out' the injustice.

Caritas Australia's Project Compassion story this week takes us to Jordan to meet 12 year old Bayan who with her family made the perilous journey from Syria. For Bayan the trauma of the conflict, and the disruption of her childhood, the Caritas Education Program in Jordan has been a source of encouragement. With this support Bayan looks with hope towards a future where she can finish her education and achieve her dreams.

The Project Compassion theme is 'A Just Future'. For Bayan and many other children around the world, a just future starts with a safe place to learn. The major humanitarian crisis which continues to unfold in Syria highlights the inevitable chaos when we forget we are one human family. Programs such as these are an example of what a community like ours can contribute. By supporting and acting for justice and speaking out for the hundreds of thousands of children, women and men who have become displaced in Syria, we imitate Jesus taking action in the temple.
