

JESUS SENT HIS DISCIPLES TWO BY TWO

"Two are better than one." (Eccles. 4:9.)

One of the most amazing features of the Gospels, and of the ministry of the Lord Jesus, is the men He chose to be His disciples. Several were fishermen. One was a former tax collector for Rome. A couple of them were quick tempered. One of them was a revolutionary. One was a traitor and not a true believer at all. All were very common men.

These men lacked spiritual understanding. They lacked humility. They lacked faith. They lacked commitment. They lacked power. These men were always getting into trouble; missing the point or Christ's teachings; lashing out at people who were different; saying the wrong thing; walking away from their commitment to Jesus; among other failures and problems.

In spite of their weaknesses, the Lord used these men to turn the world upside down for His glory. If He can use them, surely He can use us too!

Let us listen to these words of Vatican II's Decree on the Laity: "Incorporated into Christ's Mystical Body through baptism and strengthened by the power of the Holy spirit through confirmation, the laity are assigned to the apostolate by the Lord Himself," (no. 3).

They were sent out "two by two". **Matthew 10:2-4** give us some idea of how these men may have been paired up. There are a couple of reasons Jesus sent them out this way.

- It fulfilled the requirements of the Law for every testimony to be established by the words of at least two witnesses – **Deut. 17:6; 19:15; Num. 35:30.**
- It provided the men with companionship, encouragement and for someone to pray for them.
- This was the method used by John the Baptist when he sent out his followers, **Luke 7:18-19.**
- This has been the method followed by Christians since the days of Jesus. The early church employed this method, **Acts 13:2-3; 15:39-41; 19:22.**
- It is still the best method today. When two people go out to share the Gospel together, they can encourage one another, pray for one another and help one another

When you go out to tell this world about Jesus take a fellow believer with you, it will make the job easier.

Our Savior is in the life-changing, soul-saving business! One of the most amazing truths is that He desires us to have a part in His ministry. When we hear His call, accept His commission, walk in faith and share His message with a lost and dying world, we can expect Him to honor His Word, **Isa. 55:11**, and save the lost.

The Wisdom of Pope Francis

The Beatitudes are like a Christian's identity card. So if anyone asks: "What must one do to be a good Christian?", the answer is clear. We have to do, each in our own way, what Jesus told us in the Sermon on the Mount. In the Beatitudes, we find a portrait of the Master, which we are called to reflect in our daily lives. The word "happy" or "blessed" thus becomes a synonym for "holy". It expresses the fact that those faithful to God and his word, by their self-giving, gain true happiness.

Clayfield Conversations

Over the next few weeks, we will share an edited version of an interview conducted by international Catholic website, *Crux*, with Archbishop Mark Coleridge while he attended an international conference in Rome.

Laity could have prevented 'catastrophic' crisis (Part II)

Crux: You've spoken about the importance of changing culture and that of the local and universal churches coming together. But often times, when we talk about these issues, we reduce the Church to clergy and religious. What is the role the laity is expected to play, but also, needs to be allowed to play in the changing of the culture when it comes to clerical abuse?

I think that if it was left to just the clergy and religious, culture won't change. I think the lay people, the baptized, who are most of the Church, have a crucial role to play. I haven't looked at the breakout of this group of 75, but I would think that at least half would be lay people. And they're in crucial roles, they really are.

It has often been said, and it's hard to dispute, that if there had been more lay people involved in decision making roles in times past, we wouldn't have the catastrophe on our hands that we now have. It's not an option, and I think this is at the heart of this cultural shift.

To break the patterns of clericalism, this is something that emerged with extraordinary clarity in the Royal Commission in Australia. Clericalism has been at the heart of the problem. How you define clericalism is a teleologic thing.

There's no point in denying that, generally, clericalism was at the heart of the problem, and still is. Part of the culture shift we're trying to bring about is to break the hold of that clericalism. Therefore, obviously lay people need to take responsibilities that are new in the Catholic Church. It's true in Rome, and I think Pope Francis certainly understands that. And it's definitely true in places such as my own diocese of Brisbane and throughout Australia. That is a major challenge.

Crux: We're seeing an interesting interaction on this in Mexico, where the archbishop of Mexico City and the diocese and SNAP have announced that they will be as a whole actually working together.

I've seen that. It's something that I would like to do, to work more closely with abuse survivors' groups. It's not the easiest thing to do, not all the groups are keen on working with the bishops. But I'm very interested to see what is happening in Mexico, I'd like to know more about it, what shape it will have and how did it come about.

The pastoral outreach to survivors is another major element of the cultural shift. How do we work with them? Because there has been such a sense of antagonism, that we have to move beyond if we're going to make progress at all.
