

Jesus sat down, called the twelve, and said to them, "Whoever wants to be first must be last of all and servant of all." Then he took a little child and put it among them; and taking it in his arms, he said to them, 'Whoever welcomes one such child in my name welcomes me, and whoever welcomes me welcomes not me but the one who sent me."

Dear friends,

Today's gospel begins with, "After leaving the mountain"....But which mountain are we talking about? It is the mountain of the Transfiguration that Mark is talking about. Jesus' disciples are no better. Jesus has been teaching them and teaching them, and time after time, they have been struggling to come to grips with what he is saying. The problem is that Jesus has been teaching in a kind of a code language and the disciples have been struggling to comprehend. And here, we find the disciples are at it again. This time they are arguing about which one of them is the most important. We have the same arguments, it is just that we argue in a more subtle way. When Jesus asks them what they were arguing about, they are smart enough to know to keep their mouths closed. Their silence is a little victory for Jesus. It is then we see the master teacher at work. Jesus knows that his words haven't worked. He knows that any display of exasperation won't worked. He also knows that their silence makes them teachable, so he chooses another tact all together. Jesus must have been quite at home and free with children because, and not for the only time, he uses the world of a child to teach people something about the kingdom of God.

Apart from family affection, children weren't considered to have any great status or rights. They could be bought and sold into slavery. In a moment of genius, Jesus takes a child and says to his disciples, "You think that you are important, you think that you are special or privileged, well, have a look at this child. This child is gateway to God. No one is more special than these smallest ones." The disciples ambitious squabbles are put in their place, but will they listen? Will we?

On the one hand, we can all see how this message is directed towards anyone who has taken on a public role in church – people like me, for example. Ambition and the abuse of power strangles the proclamation of the gospel. But this gospel is not just directed towards people like me, it is directed towards each of us, to every generation of Christians. This gospel story asks us about what is the focus of our life. Are we focusing exclusively on our own agenda? Jesus says to us, "Life is not about accumulating possessions, or acquiring status and prestige. Life is about pouring ourselves out, and letting go of things and not always needing to get our own way." This is a difficult message to get and it is a harder message to live. The disciples took ages to get the message, and so, if we are slow, we are in good company. Worldly prestige matters little before God. It is the little ones, the least, who are the most prestigious in God's world. Ask any child – they know this by heart....they know that they are important...or at least should be. Adults can tend to forget, but Jesus, the master teacher, is good at reminding us. It is the small, the unnoticed, that are great in the eyes of God. It is from little things that big things grow. 
Clayfield Conversations
