#### The Slides.

Our focus at Mass is either the Ambo or the Altar around which we gather for Word and Sacrament. Sometimes the focus is on the priest who leads us in Christ or the focus is the entire community as we make our way forward in the Communion procession. So you may notice fewer slides being seen at Mass this weekend so that we are not distracted from our praying together and still rely on our more than capable memories, faith and love of the Mass.

#### SAINTS CYRIL, MONK AND METHODIUS, BISHOP - 14 FEBRUARY

Cyril: Born about 826 in Thessalonica (Greece). Died at Rome in 869.

His brother, Methodius: Born about 815. Died in Velehrad (Czech Republic) in 885.

With papal approval they preached the gospel in Moravia using their own translations of the Scriptures and the liturgy in the local lan-guage. These translations into Slavonic were based on an alphabet they invented, now called Cyrillic. The success of their preaching aroused jealous Frankish opposition. Honoured as apostles of the Slavic peoples. Remembered together for their contribution to Slavic culture, for their missionary inculturation of the faith, and for establishing links between East and West.

### Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time

#### UNDERSTANDING THE WORD - The call of Simon Peter

In his introduction Luke had promised 'to write . . . down in an orderly sequence' (1:3) 'a narrative of the events that have been fulfilled among us' (1:1). This Sunday's episode - the call of the first disciples - is a good example of Luke's 'orderly sequence'. Mark's gospel begins with a telescoped account of John the Baptist's ministry, a very brief report of Jesus' baptism and temptations in the wilderness, and a two verse summary of Jesus' initial preaching. Then, out of the blue, Jesus meets and calls his first disciples in the sixteenth verse of the first chapter! Apart from Jesus' announcement that the Kingdom of God is at hand, he has done no preaching, performed no miracles, expelled no demons; yet when he calls Peter and Andrew, James and John, they drop everything and follow him.

By contrast, Luke carefully prepares the ground for this dramatic call. After an elaborate infancy narrative that explicitly lays out the identity of Jesus, Luke begins with an extended presentation of John's ministry, a more detailed narration of the baptism, a dramatic account of the three temptations in the wilderness, and Jesus' inaugural sermon in the synagogue in Nazareth; then (omitted from the Lectionary) Luke gives us more of Jesus' teaching in Capernaum and several healings (a possessed man, Simon's mother-in-law, and the sick villagers). Only now does Jesus call Simon Peter. By this time the credentials of Jesus have been clearly established and Simon has personally witnessed the healing of his mother-in-law. Further, in Luke's account, there is a miraculous catch of fish - not reported in the other three versions of the call of Simon. Luke provides a record of accomplishment and a factual basis on which Simon and the others can make their response. Luke makes both Jesus' authority and Peter's response something readers can relate to

The presence of Jesus brings about great transformations: empty nets become overflowing and a man who protested to Jesus, 'depart from me!' ends up following him. In this last transformation Jesus' power turns a sinner into a disciple.... Liturgia


