One of the most important tasks entrusted to any Parish is the handing on of our sacramental tradition. The Christian faith and the Catholic tradition particularly places high importance on being sacramental. This essentially means that God, incarnate in Jesus Christ, reveals God's own self to us in tangible ways and through our human senses. Water oil, light, incense, bread, wine and the Word of God proclaimed are some of the means by which we can participate in the life of God. These elements in themselves are not divine but they are indeed means by which God reveals God's self to us. It follows then that the Parish Sacramental program is a high priority in the Parish Calendar and requires the involvement of every member.

This week there is a Parent/Guardian meeting whose children will prepare for the Sacrament of Penance. While this sacrament is offered to children before their Holy Communion it involves very simple preparation. The Sacramental Policy of Brisbane Archdiocese states that the main preparation for this sacrament occurs for children who are aged ten years or older. It is considered that at this age they have a better understanding of the Sacrament of Penance.

I invite all of us to pray for the children and their families over these coming weeks. It is in the midst of family that we learn to say sorry and treasure unconditional love and forgiveness. So too do families hand on to their children the importance of God's unconditional love and forgiveness for us in the Sacrament of Penance.

The Community and Mission Council also meet this Monday evening. This Council discusses issues that are important in the life of the Parish. They are also an important means for the Pastor, especially if he is recently appointed, to hear from parishioners about the concerns they may have or initiatives they believe should be considered. Please speak with a Council member or contact the Parish Office if there is a matter you believe should be considered at this time.

The Chair of Saint Peter the Apostle - 22 February

The chair (cathedra) of a bishop is a pre-eminent sign of his teaching authority and pastoral oversight of a local Church. This feast, observed in Rome since the fourth century, celebrates Peter, first among the apostles, as founder of the See of Rome and the focus of unity in the communion of one faith.

St Polycarp, Bishop and Martyr - 23 February

Born about the year 69. Died on this day about 155 at Smyrna (Turkey), where he had been the beloved and respected bishop. A disciple of Saint John the apostle (27 December) who wrote to the Philippians to strengthen their faith and to defend the Church against heresy. Remembered because of the account of his martyrdom for his fearless acknowledgment of Christ, and honoured as one of the apostolic fathers of the Church.

Clayfield Conversations

Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time

UNDERSTANDING THE WORD - The Beatitudes in Luke

Luke's Beatitudes are part of a longer instruction (6:17-49) sometimes called 'The Sermon on the Plain' (as opposed to Matthew's more famous Sermon on the Mount). The major theme of this sermon is discipleship: notice that Luke has Jesus addressing 'his disciples'.

As an instruction on discipleship it is noteworthy that Luke begins with words of blessing rather than a call to action. In Jesus' first sermon (OT 3) he had declared that he has come to 'bring good news to the poor' (4:18). In the Beatitudes Jesus announces the good news that the poor, the hungry, the sorrowful, and the hated are blessed by God. Blessing precedes the demands of discipleship. Earlier both Mary and Zechariah were richly blessed and they raised their voices in praise (1:46-55, 68-79).

When compared to Matthew's version of the Beatitudes certain of Luke's favourite themes become evident. Unlike Matthew who spiritualises ('the poor in spirit . . . those who hunger and thirst for righteousness'; Matt 5:3, 6), Luke addresses the materially poor. He further emphasises the material aspect of poverty by adding four 'woes' (not found in Matthew's Beatitudes) which announce judgment on the wealthy. But why does God so favour the poor? Because this is how God always acts: 'The hungry he has filled with good things; the rich he has sent away empty' (1:53). And so those who have nothing now will inherit the Kingdom. This is unmerited blessing, an offer of mercy, the gift of salvation.

In the second and third Beatitudes Luke's theme of reversal is evident: the hungry will be satisfied, the weeping will laugh. In a sense, these two Beatitudes heighten the scandal of the first, for the condition of the poor will not be reversed: they will not become materially wealthy. On the one hand, this again emphasises the material aspect of poverty. But more shockingly, it shows the superabundance of God's gift: from poverty to the Kingdom! Jesus will later dramatise this teaching in his famous parable of Lazarus and the Rich Man (Luke 16:19-31). The poor are blessed indeed! Liturgia
