Thursday 15 August

This Thursday 15<sup>th</sup> August is the Solemnity or Feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Mass times are included in the Newsletter and if you have not been on too many rides at the Ekka on People's Day there is an evening Mass on Wednesday the 14<sup>th</sup> at 5.00pm.

Following is a reflection on the Assumption by Redemptorist Publications.

Alternative and complementary medical treatments have been used for years. Although there are different kinds, and some remain controversial, one of their key principles has won widespread approval: that human beings should be treated in a holistic way, taking into account the unity of the whole person - physical and spiritual - in the quest for health and well-being. Human beings are more than a physical body to be treated. From their own experience many people would agree that unconditional love is a powerful healer, which is why doctors today are less inclined to treat symptoms with drugs when counselling and living support may be more deeply effective.

What does this have to do with the feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary, which we celebrate. The clue is in the words of Pope Pius XII when he explained it and spoke of Our Lady being "assumed body and soul into heavenly glory". At the heart of this teaching is the belief, reflected today by holistic medicine, that human beings comprise a body and soul, united together. Human beings are not just a body, nor are we simply a soul. The Hebrew word shalom is an ancient Jewish greeting. Often translated "Peace", as when Jesus says, "Peace be with you", the word has a richer meaning: Jesus is offering total well-being, harmony, wholeness.

Sadly, our human experience is that we do not live in perfect harmony within. There is an inner struggle. Sometimes we get torn apart. St Paul expressed his own experience: "I cannot understand my own behaviour. I fail to carry out the things I want to do, and I find myself doing the very things I hate." He talks about his "unspiritual self". St Peter speaks of "selfish passions that attack the soul", and James warns that we have "wrong desires" these give birth to sin. In other words, in this life our bodies and souls are not in perfect harmony together. Our struggle between good and evil, our wrong choices, sins and even death, are a consequence of what the Church calls original sin, explained by St Paul as coming from Adam.

Mary, by contrast, was "preserved from all stain of original sin": her body and soul were in perfect harmony. Consequently both her body and her soul were raised up in the kingdom. She never experienced the dislocation we do, like St Paul failing to carry out the things he wished to do. Mary wished to do only the will of God and she perfectly carried out the things God wanted her to do. She is the one person other than Jesus who can stand by every deed of her life. She lived without guilt, regret or reproach. She could enter eternity, body and soul, without need of repentance. She is, as Elizabeth told her, "Of all women... the most blessed".

# Clayfield Conversations

#### Nineteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

#### The Son of Man and the Kingdom of God

This Sunday's gospel is made up of three distinct units: the first verse is actually the conclusion of 12:22-32; the next two verses (vv. 33-34) are independent sayings about poverty and wealth. Then two parables introduce new themes: vigilance and fidelity. But the Lectionary combines these passages in a new way.

Using the image of a master returning either from a wedding (12:35-40) or from some other journey (12:42-48), Jesus instructs his disciples about the coming of the 'Son of Man' (12:40). The Lectionary uses the two parables to illustrate the opening verses in which Jesus assures his disciples that God will bless them with a 'treasure' that is inexhaustible, secure in heaven, and immune from destruction (12:33). In the Lectionary context the treasure which God gives is another metaphor for the 'kingdom'. The kingdom for which disciples are to pray (11:2) and seek (12:31) is the kingdom which God 'is pleased to give (*didomi*) you' (12:32). Thus when Jesus says, 'much will be required of the person entrusted (*didomi*) with much' (12:48), we have already been told that disciples have been entrusted with the Kingdom (the same Greek word (*didomi*) is translated as 'give' in verse 32 and as 'entrusted' in verse 48). How great, then, are the Master's expectations when the treasure is so great.

The combination of these two themes - the kingdom and the coming of the Son of Man - recalls another crucial passage, namely, Daniel 7:13-14. In this important passage one 'like a Son of Man' comes before God and is given (*didomi*) the kingdom. As the parables make clear, disciples await the coming of the Son of Man. Each of the two parables highlights different aspects of the disciples' waiting. The first parable urges vigilance so as not to be caught off-guard. The second parable demands faithfulness so as to be busy about the duties which have been assigned. Vigilance is rewarded by being served by the Master at table; fidelity in service is rewarded with greater authority, but infidelity is severely punished.... *Liturgia*








#### AUSTRALIAN CATHOLIC YOUTH FESTIVAL 2019
