ST AGATHA'S PARISH will be conducting the 2019 ANNUAL CATHOLIC **CAMPAIGN** on the weekend of 26/27 October

Around this time of the year, the Church celebrates a wonderful group of diverse There is Vincent de Paul, whose life was changed when he heard the saints. confession of a dying peasant. After that he dedicated himself to the service of poor people. He told his followers, "The poor are your masters and you are their servants." Then there is Thérèse of Lisieux, "the Little Flower", who, as a Carmelite, never left her convent and died at the age of twenty-four; soon she became universally known for the way she loved God in the ordinary ways of life. St Jerome, a great biblical scholar, dedicated his life to translating the Bible. And finally St Francis of Assisi, who imitated the love of Christ with such a boundless generosity in his service of those who were poor that he received the stigmata.

All these saints lived hard lives in a world full of suffering, but what characterises them is an extravagant love of God and a joy in serving God. They were men and women greatly gifted by God; yet they did not take the credit for themselves but gave glory to God. St Francis saw service to his master, Jesus, not as a duty but as a privilege. And they all had a deep and trusting faith in God, which allowed them to do what seemed impossible.

It is good to keep these great saints in mind when we turn to the Gospel today. There is a harshness in Jesus' parable. He talks of servants (or, in some translations, slaves) and masters, a common reality in Jesus' time. He is attacking those religious leaders who thought that they deserved a reward for following God's law. It was as though they felt God owed them something. It is a common danger in religion to think we can save ourselves by our own good works; all God needs to do is to acknowledge what we have achieved by ourselves. God is there to hand out the prizes.

Jesus tells this parable to deflate our self-righteousness. After all, there is no equality between master and servant. Would you expect the master to tell the servant, after a day in the fields, to come and have a meal? No, it is more likely the servant would have to serve the master before eating his or her own supper. Why would the master be grateful to the servant, who is only doing his or her duty? Jesus is puncturing false ideas. If you see God with the eyes of faith you will realise that God is our creator and all that we have is God's gift. All that we possess we have received. In fact we are called to imitate God's generosity. When Jesus tells his disciples they must forgive seven times, they ask for an increase of faith. They need the grace to trust God. Jesus tells them that with only a little faith they can perform the impossible.

This is why we need to keep the saints close to us. Their lives give flesh to the Gospel. We can see God's love taking human form in their lives. They are wounded by divine love and respond with an extravagance that shocks us. They experience God not as a slave master but as a Lord who has emptied himself in love and shared our sufferings. They delight in God's service and are happy to say, "We are merely servants: we have done no more than our duty."

## Twenty Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time

## Scriptural context – A lesson for the disciples

For the last few months, in the Sunday gospel readings, we have been working our way through the second half of the gospel of Luke. From the end of chapter 9 onwards, the gospel charts the journey of Jesus towards Jerusalem. Throughout this journey, Jesus teaches his disciples and attempts to prepare them for his departure and their need to step up and take on his ministry. Today's passage is an example of this instruction to the disciples. Jesus makes clear that they are being called to give their lives to faith in service of others without expecting any return – just as Jesus does!

## Gospel Focus – Faith

The disciples ask Jesus to increase their faith, but their question – and the reply given by Jesus – does not make clear the faith that they want increased. Is it their faith in God; their faith in themselves; or their faith in the people they are called to serve? The response by Jesus suggests that, in fact, it is faith in all these things. Faith in God and faith in self are intrinsically linked and Jesus makes plain to the disciples that this faith must find its expression in selfless service to others... *Liturgy Help*
