BREAK OPEN THE WORD

Accountancy might not seem like a profession concerned with the end of all things, but actually it is the fundamental idea of accountancy. An accountant's job is to measure the value of a company, a charity, or some other association involving money. The question the accountant asks is this: "If this firm was to close, how much would it be worth at that time?" That is a question we should ask about our own lives and about every human institution that has come into being. What would it be worth when it ends?

But in this case, it is not a question about the financial worth, or course. The value we are concerned with is how much it is worth in the eyes of God

Earlier in the chapter of Matthew from which today's Gospel reading is taken, the warming of Christ is this: "false prophets... will deceive many and, with the increase of lawlessness, love in most men [and women] will grow cold". So the accountancy of life is measured in love. You notice that Jesus does not say that there will be no love; instead, love will have grown cold, which means that it no longer reaches out to others. It is a fire that warms only a few, and is not shared with the stranger. You might also notice that it is "lawlessness" that cools our love. Love and law are not opposites, but good law is the fuel of love.

Here is how you can make life interesting. All you have to do is pay attention. When we get bored with life, it is because we don't take the trouble to understand its meaning. Every moment of our life we are making decisions about how to live: the most important of all is the decision to look for God's purpose in every moment of our lives, or the decision to ignore God. When we get bored, we start looking for some dramatic change in our lives; we want to get away from where we are. We can be so concerned with being somewhere else that we end up not being anywhere.

Meanwhile life goes on. We are warned against looking for signs of the Lord's return. Then again, it would be foolish to think that anything on this earth lasts for ever. So Jesus is telling us to concentrate on the ordinary things of life, and to be at peace with our neighbour. He will come again; but he will cone in his own good time.



First Sunday of Advent (Year A)

Scriptural context – Burglars in the night

The teachings and sayings of Jesus reveal him to be a clever public speaker and story teller. His use of imagery and language captivated the imagination of his audience. However, we have tended to endow his every word with awesome significance and layers of meaning. Today's reading is an example where Jesus used a confronting image simply to gain his audience's attention. He does not intend to suggest that God sneaks up on us like a burglar and is seeking to catch us out. The image conveys the need to prepare for what might happen unexpectedly.

Historical Context – The Advent Wreath

One of the major symbols of the Advent season is the wreath. The encircling wreath is symbolic of God without beginning or end and the green foliage represents our hope in God. There are usually five candles in the wreath, a central white candle representing the light of Christ that came into the world and then four outside candles that are usually purple and rose coloured. The first candle is generally symbolic of Hope and Expectation. The third candle – the rose or pink candle – celebrates the Joy that is anticipated in the coming of Christ. The progressive lighting of the candles marks the journey towards the Nativity...*Liturgy Help*

Stories of Faith: Anonymous

I came close to God through crisis. In many ways I feel like the prodigal son. When my wife was diagnosed with cancer [in her 20s] my

understanding of my faith was changed forever. Two years into her journey, I had completely turned my back on God – why would a loving God allow my wife to die and be in so much pain? Why would he let her get cancer at precisely the time we were planning to have children? Why would my life be completely disrupted to become her carer – losing my job and moving away from friends and family? I did not understand God, or where He was in my life at all. But I did witness my wife completely surren-

der her life to Him. She knew she was going to die and that God would take her to Heaven when He was ready for her. Three-and-a-half years after the diagnosis, He did exactly that. And I then realised that God was helping me the whole time – He was working through me to care for her, to be God for her and to love her.
