Twelfth Sunday in Ordinary Time

The First Prayer that I learned...

The first prayer that most parents teach their children is the Sign of the Cross and it is my reflection for this week.

The most basic Christian gesture in prayer is and always will be the sign of the cross. Francis de Sales explains the sign of the Cross, "We raise the hand first to the forehead, saying, 'In the name of the Father,' to signify that the Father is the First Person of the Most Holy Trinity, of whom the Son is begotten and from whom the Holy Spirit proceeds. Then saying, 'and the Son,' the hand is lowered to the breast, to express that the Son proceeds from the Father, who sent Him down to the womb of the Virgin.

Then the hand is moved from the left shoulder or side to the right, while saying, 'and of the Holy Spirit,' thereby signifying that the Holy Spirit, as the Third Person of the Holy Trinity, proceeds from the Father and the Son, that He is the Love that unites both, and that we, through His grace, partake of the fruits of the passion.

Accordingly the sign of the cross is a brief declaration of our faith in the three great mysteries: of our faith in the Blessed Trinity, in the passion of Christ, and in the forgiveness of sin, by which we pass from the left side of curse to the right of blessing." (The Sign of the Cross, The Fifteen Most Powerful Words in the English Language)

The cross is a source of all blessings and graces, the weapon and armor of our defense against the evil power. It is the sign of Christ's victory over sin, death, and hell.

When we make the Sign of the Cross we are exactly doing the following 21 things:

1. Pray. We begin and end our prayers with the Sign of the Cross. The sign of the cross is a beautiful gesture which reminds us of the cross of salvation while invoking the Holy Trinity.
2. We open ourselves to grace. As a sacramental, the Sign of the Cross prepares us for receiving God's blessing and disposes us to cooperate with His grace.
3. Sanctifies the day.
4. It commits the whole self to Christ.
5. Recalls the Incarnation.
6. Remembers the Passion of Our Lord.
7. Affirms the Trinity.
8. Focuses our prayer on God.
9. Affirms the procession of the Son and the Spirit.
10. Confesses our faith.
11. Invokes the power of God's name.
12. Crucifies ourselves with Christ.
13. Asks for support in our suffering.
14. Reaffirms our baptism.
15. Reverses the curse.
16. Remakes ourselves in Christ's image.
17. Marks ourselves for Christ.
18. Helps us soldier on for Christ.
19. Wards off the devil.
20. Seals ourselves in the Spirit.
21. We become witnesses to others.



ST AGATHA'S SACRAMENT OF CONFIRMATION 2020 REGISTRATION (All baptised children in Grade 3)



Color in the shapes that contain a dot • and discover the hidden message!




