Fourth Sunday of Lent 13/14 March 2021

We adore you O Christ and we praise you, because by your holy Cross you have redeemed the world.

Every Friday, during Lent we practice the Stations of the Cross in our church. The Stations of the Cross is a powerful way to contemplate, and enter into, the mystery of Jesus' gift of himself to us. It brings us closer to Christ as we meditate on the great love He showed for us in His most sorrowful Passion! We also do this as an act of penance. The Stations of the Cross involve Jesus enduring suffering, insults, moments of support, and relay the intense sacrifice that we know Jesus undertook for human salvation.

From the earliest of days, fathers of the church told the story of Jesus' passion, death and resurrection. When pilgrims came to see Jerusalem, they were anxious to see the sites where Jesus was. These sites become important holy connections with Jesus. Eventually, following in the footsteps of the Lord, along the way of the cross, became a part of the pilgrimage visit.

The stations, as we know them today, came about when it was no longer easy or even possible to visit the holy sites. In the 1500's, villages all over Europe started creating "replicas" of the way of the cross, with small shrines commemorating the places along the route in Jerusalem. Eventually, these shrines became the set of 14 stations we now know and were placed in almost every Catholic Church in the world.

Through His Passion, Christ saved us in satisfying Divine Justice for humanity's offenses going back to Adam and Eve's fall from grace and Original Sin. Yet, while He opened the gates of Heaven for us, He didn't promise us paradise here on earth. Jesus handled His suffering with great dignity and grace. This is not meant to diminish our own trials and tribulations but rather to give us a sense of perspective, as we look upon Christ as a model of patience and perseverance in His Passion! As St. Gregory once noted, "If we recall the Passion of Christ, nothing seems so hard that it cannot be borne with equanimity."

Let us remember the words of our Lord "He who does not take up his cross and follow me is not worthy of me" (Matt 10:38).




